On November 11, 1918, at the eleventh hour, an armistice between the Allied nations and Germany was reached, leading to the Treaty of Versailles and the end of World War I.

Frank Chavez, an HRIS Analyst at PRIDE Industries since 2018, passed away unexpectedly in October.

Frank Chavez, an HRIS Analyst at PRIDE Industries since 2018, passed away unexpectedly in October.

Prior to joining PRIDE Industries, Frank served 21 years in the United States Army, spending half of that time as Human Resources Senior NCO and the other half as a Field Artillery Cannoneer. Shortly before his death, Frank shared his employment journey with Soldiers

for Life, a U.S. Army program created to help connect current soldiers, veterans, and their families with education, employment, health and wellness services. As a combat veteran with PTSD, Frank had a hard time finding employment when he retired, complicating the transition from military to civilian life. He found that a veteran with 21 years of experience wasn't always welcome.

"There is a stigma out there that someone with PTSD is not able to function in the civilian workforce due to

how people think they interact with others," he said.

Frank also found scant resources to help him obtain work that harnessed his skills and experience. "I kept getting steered toward entry-level positions that agencies wanted to fill rather than work that would use the skills and experience I gained in the military, or that would leverage my knowledge," he said. "Some agencies even asked me to water down my resume so I could apply for jobs that required no experience."

In 2017, Frank turned to Work for Warriors, a free job placement program for service members, veterans, and military family members in Sacramento, Calif., and a PRIDE Industries partner. Work for Warriors introduced Frank to PRIDE Industries' Veterans Liaison Frank Goehringer.

"From the minute I walked through the front door, I felt welcomed," Frank said. "The recruiting team did a phenomenal job of introducing me to PRIDE Industries' mission and gave me a tour, and they really wanted me to understand what the company is all about."

The experience struck a chord.

"I felt like it was my calling to be a part of PRIDE Industries," Frank said. "I had a sister who had behavioral health issues, and I could relate to the need for resources to help people with disabilities."

PRIDE Industries hired Frank as an HR Analyst, leveraging his HR experience in the Army.

"I was allowed to articulate what I can bring to the company instead of being told what my limitations are," Frank said.

When Frank passed away, he had been at PRIDE Industries for more than five years, where he showed the same sense of duty that he had in the Army. "We don't give up on the mission," he once said.

"PRIDE Industries welcomed me with open arms the



minute I walked through the door," he said. "They gave me the resources to transition from the military to the civilian workforce and accepted who I was and what I brought to the table."

"At the same time, they didn't treat me any differently than other employees—what they gave me most of all was respect."

A grateful company, and a grateful nation, thank you for your service, Frank.

Shannon Bloxham's road at PRIDE Industries is long and winding.

In 1997, she was 23 years old, working full time and going to school part time, struggling to make ends meet. Working for a package delivery company at night and attending school during the day was exhausting. Meanwhile, Shannon's friends who joined the military bragged about the great benefits, like free college tuition.

Shannon's father and grandfather had served in the Navy, but it had never occurred to her to join. The possibility of free college led her to a United States Air Force recruiting office, where she learned she could get her bachelor's and a master's degree. With those boxes checked, it was on to boot camp at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas.

After basic training, Shannon went to Keesler Air Force Base in Biloxi, Mississippi for tech school and later became an information manager.

"It was a fancy name for 'secretary,' but the job changed because the Air Force was shifting from typewriters to computers, and they needed computer technicians," Shannon said.

Shannon's next stop was MacDill Air Force Base in Tampa, Florida, with the Wing Plans Office of the 6th Air Mobllity Wing—aka the XP shop. The most exciting part of her job was when the office conducted basewide exercises or responded to real-world events.

"I was on the Crisis Action Team that prepared for everything from enemy attacks to hurricanes," she said. "I provided administrative support for the bunker."

The bunker was a fortified shelter where all the base commanders, including the installation commander and other staff, ran drills to train for crises.

"Sometimes we were down there working 14-hour days for two weeks straight," Shannon said.

Shannon's proudest moment in her time in the Air Force was being selected Airman Below the Zone, a competitive early promotion program offered to Airmen First Class who stand out from their peers. "I became a Senior Airman six months early."

Shannon was also selected to compete for The Outstanding Airman of the Year, representing MacDill Air Force Base, by the Air Force Sergeants Association.

Another proud achievement: getting the on-base colleges (three, at the time) to retain and reuse textbooks each semester. These measures spared military students the exorbitant cost of new books.

Shannon completed her BA in psychology at St. Leo University in Florida while still in the Air Force. "I wanted to help people—to connect them with services," she said. When her enlistment ended, she went to the University of Texas at Austin and got her MSSW degree in two and a half years.

Educational mission accomplished!

After two years working in Child Protective Services, Shannon served five years as a Guardian ad Litem—a neutral, court-appointed advocate for children.

"Before the military, I was super shy. I was a different person when I got out," said Shannon. "Not only could I speak for myself, but now I could speak clearly for others. That really helped in my positions with CPS and as Guardian ad Litem."

Around this time, Shannon met her husband, who was in the United States Army at Fort Hood. After they got married, her husband went to flight school and ended up at Fort Rucker, Alabama, where Shannon discovered PRIDE Industries.

"I was looking for a social work-ish job," Shannon said.
"I also had to adjust to a new role—military spouse.
Your life gets uprooted every couple of years, and it isn't easy." She was hired as a Rehabilitation Counselor and joined the AbilityOne program supporting and recruiting employees with disabilities.

A year later, it was on to Fort Bliss, Texas, and Shannon continued working for PRIDE Industries as a Rehabilitation Counselor/Acting Manager. A bump in the road came when the couple transferred to Fort Bragg, North Carolina. PRIDE Industries has no presence there, but that didn't keep Shannon from becoming a Rehabilitation Director. She now oversees programs at Fort Bliss, Fort Rucker, Fort Polk, and Central Texas sites, working remotely.

From working in package delivery to managing a multibase team, we're grateful that Shannon's road led her to PRIDE Industries.





I spent three years in active duty and 34 with the California National Guard. I came in as a Wheel Vehicle Mechanic and retired as a Command Sergeant Major. Now I run the landscaping maintenance program at Travis Air Force Base, training employees on equipment use. I enjoy helping people facing challenges in life take care of themselves.

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Ameer Habeeb

Ameer Habeeb joined the United States Air Force in 1996, rose to Senior Airman Below the Zone, and became a Crew Chief on C-5 aircraft in his four years of service at Travis Air Force Base.

"I enjoyed my time in the military," Ameer said. "In basic training, they give you challenges that you don't think you can do, but by the time you get out, you think you can do anything."

That feeling didn't last when, in 2000, the New York native decided to stay in sunny California for his post-military career.

"It was a difficult transition for me," Ameer said. "I did every undesirable job in California before I found PRIDE Industries. I sold door to door, worked in collections, worked in restaurants, but I could never get very far."

Having disabilities made it hard for Ameer to get ahead because employers didn't know how to help him succeed. "I have anxiety disorder and bipolar disorder that can be very severe, and there was a time I couldn't get out of bed for three months. Employers don't see you as a whole person, and some gave me a hard time for taking time off for medical appointments, for example."

"I always wondered why I could have so much success in the military and not outside it," Ameer said. "I was Senior Airman Below the Zone and a multi-million-dollar aircraft had my name on the side of it, but no one would trust me to do anything."

Then came PRIDE Industries.

"When I found PRIDE Industries, it was a blessing," Ameer said. "I was managing restaurants and hit the ceiling where I couldn't earn more. Then I found out about a job in a correctional facility working with other people with disabilities, and I applied immediately."

Ameer started as an Environmental Service Technician and loved the support he received. "I could go to my doctors' appointments without fear," he said. "If I experienced symptoms, I could take a break. They wanted me to be successful, and I dove right in."

His hard work paid off. In four months, Ameer became an Environmental Services Supervisor. Next came Assistant Operations Manager. A year later, Ameer

was made Systems Operations Manager and is now Environmental Services Director.

"PRIDE Industries is a company where you can use what you learned in the military," Ameer said. "Traits like hard work, dedication, teamwork, organizational skills, and looking out for each other are rewarded. We go by our core values in the Air Force: Integrity First, Service Before Self, and Excellence In All We Do. Those words are on my wall."

Those values drive Ameer to help others succeed.

"What I love most about my job is my people," he said. "I love seeing potential in people whether they see it in themselves or not, training them, and giving them opportunities. We've done 20 promotions in the last 18 months, which keeps me going."

"At PRIDE Industries, everyone has the opportunity to succeed," Ameer said. "We will accommodate you with



whatever you need. Accommodation is not expensive or hard. Seeing someone succeed because you gave them a chance—that's why I love my job."

Ameer has a message for employers.


"Veterans with disabilities are whole people. They do a great job. They are on task, know how to work in a team, are motivated, can structure work and get it done, and their production is excellent. If you have a chance to hire a veteran, you should do it!"

He also has a message for vets struggling to find work.

"Remember your feelings when you were doing what you were doing in the service. Those feelings of confidence, feelings of teamwork—those opportunities are still out there. You can do it."

And he has special advice for any vets with the opportunity to work at PRIDE Industries.

"If you have the opportunity to work at PRIDE Industries, do it. The company cares about veterans, and it cares about me. When I met the president of the company, he knew my name. You are a whole person here."






